

PAPER I

Time: 3 Hrs.

Max. Marks: 50

Books prescribed for detailed study:

- (i) Explanations with reference to the context. (12 marks)

Questions on the books prescribed for non detailed study shall require short answers of 25 to 40 words and shall be designed to test objectivity and the candidate's close reading of these texts.

This paper will also carry a question requiring a candidate to translate an unseen passage of about 200 words from Hindi to English or answer questions on a comprehension passage of the same length (10 marks)

Paper II

Max. Marks: 50

Duration: 3 hours

Section A: Candidates will be required to attempt one question exercise based on chapters I, IV, V, VI and VII of Wren.

(10 marks)

Section B: Candidates will be required to attempt two question exercises based on Units 5 to 8 of Champa Tickoo & Sasikumar (10 marks + 10 marks)

Section C: Candidates will be required to answer sixty excercises (no choice) based on English Grammar and Usage, Thompson & Martinet. Vol. II

(20 marks).

Viva Voice: 50 marks

The oral examination will test a candidate's ability to understand English speech and to respond in English (35 marks). A candidate shall submit before the examiners the written work done by him in the B.A. I & B.A. II language classes (15 marks) (8)

ENGLISH LANGUAGE SYLLABUS

The B.A. Part III courses are designed with the belief that students of this level, who have chosen to opt for English language group, wish to achieve a reasonable level of proficiency in the written language. While the first two years take care of the basics (grammar and comprehension), the third year course equips the student to write and appreciate different forms of the language. The justification of the course is in no way based on any kind of vocational training, but an effort to make the student competent in the use of the language in any situation.

The course is, therefore, specialized and concentrates on the development of writing skills. Along with this, it was thought important to develop the student's ability to assess writing and to be aware of different styles. The syllabus is divided into three papers of 50 marks each and a viva-voce of 75 marks. The papers are as follows: -

Paper - I Essay and Precis

Duration: 3 hrs.

Max. Marks.: 50

What is an essay? Different kinds of essays (descriptive, narrative, reflective, and argumentative). How to write an essay (its parts, their relationship, words, grammar, thoughts and organization).

The aim of this part of the paper is to develop the student's ability to write an essay and not to test his knowledge of the forms theoretically. Hence the student must write at least 10 essays during the year (one year) and keep these in his/her file as record of work done. These essays will be graded by the teacher and presented to the viva-voce board.

The precis section of the paper will concentrate on how to write a precis of different kinds of passages. At least 10 passage must be handled during the year and a similar record of work must be kept. The question paper shall consist of two sections: -

- (i) Essay One essay to be written out of three options (25 marks)
- (ii) **Precis** One precis passage of 600 words (no choice) (25 marks)

Paper II: Writing Skills

Duration: 3 hrs.

Max. Marks 50

Different forms of writing: letter, feature, report, review, paraphrase, dialogue, and short story, their main characteristics and specialities. The process of idea formation and effective communication in the above forms. This is the core of the paper where the student actually learns how compositions are made in these forms. He/she has to do class room exercises which are designed to stimulate the process of creativity as well as make for effective communication. A record of the work must be maintained for the viva-voce board.

The question paper will have two parts. The first part will test the student's knowledge of the forms through eight short-answer questions out of which students will attempt any five. Each question will carry five marks. The second part will require a student to write two compositions out of four options. These may be topics, situations, startings etc. One composition will carry 15 marks and the other 10.

Paper III LANGUAGE THROUGH LITERATURE

Duration: 3 hrs.

Max. Marks: 50

An understanding and appreciation of different types of prose from the selections:

- (i) An English Miscellany: Tongue & Shiv Kumar, O.U.P.
- (ii) Forms of English Prose: English Dept, Lucknow University, O.U.P.

Types of English language, with stress on the contemporary criticism and review of different types of prose. The question paper shall consist of two parts of 25 marks each. Part One will have questions on the styles and themes of the texts prescribed. These essays from Forms of English Prose are prescribed:

 Francis Bacon: Of Studies' Richard Steele: The Spectator Club', Charles Lamb: 'Dream Children'.

A.G. Gardiner: "On the Rule of the Road," Robert Lynd: "One's Habits."

 The entire Prose section from An English Miscellany is prescribed except for M.E. Oltey's 'The Engagement' and C.E.M. Joad's, 'A Dialogue on Civilization'.

There will be objective type questions of one mark each

of five short answer questions of five marks each. (No choice) Part Two will require a student to attempt practical criticism of 3 to 5 passages, with submitted internal choice.

THE VIVA-VOCE will carry 75 marks divided as follows 40 marsk for the viva-voce and 35 for class exercises.
