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Concept Note

Poetry is not a luxury. It is a vital necessity of our existence. It forms the quality of the light within which we predicate our hopes and dreams toward survival and change, first made into language, then into idea, then into more tangible action.

- Audre Lorde, "Poetry is Not a Luxury" (1977)

A poem, at its best, may be seen as a metaphor for the ideal in worldly existence. Poetry, therefore, is the perennial human endeavour towards perfection, not just as a wishfulfilment exercise but as a commitment to imagining amelioration of the world. Significantly, human civilisation has been evolving through the human effort at poeming the world. We humans dream, act, err, make amends and move on, just like the lines of poetry. Poetry has not only been cheering humanity through its triumphs but seeing it through its travails as well. If the world today is plagued by challenges ranging from the geopolitical to the ecological, then there are poets who are appealing to our collective imagination to seek creative ways of addressing them. Gopal Lahiri, the inaugural winner of Jayanta Mahapatra National Award for Literature appositely avers that 'in times of distress, poetry can trigger conversations and heal your wounds'. The earth scientist and eco-poet, therefore, pleads: "Poetry, like bread, should be for everyone".

Jayanta Mahapatra (22 October 1928 - 27 August 2023) is a name to reckon with, in the English-speaking world. Someone who belongs to the community known as poets dedicated to dreaming of a better world through their pursuit of poeming it. The first Indian poet to win the Sahitya Akademi Award for English poetry, Mahapatra was a physicist by training and a poet by calling. Along with A. K. Ramanujan and R. Parthasarathy, he formed the trio of poets credited with founding what has been canonised as Indian English Poetry. Mahapatra stands out for what Meena Alexandar argues, in her article published in *The Journal of Commonwealth Literature*, 18 (1), 42 - 47, as 'poetry of decreation'. Decreation denotes a certain quality of attention, an emptying out of the self, an almost mystical waiting. No wonder, Mahapatra Studies has become a burgeoning field. The two-day seminar proposes to provide a platform for conversations on Indian poetry in English foregrounding Jayanta Mahapatra. Research papers can address to topics such as follows:
